- To submit work composed by someone else or a machine-based artificial intelligence (e.g. ChatGPT), whether published or unpublished, as your own;
- To submit someone else's work under your own name;
- Directly transferring text from another source without formal citation and/or acknowledgement within the text;
- Using ideas, statements or argumentation, without crediting the source;
- Using visual images (e.g. photographs, charts, graphs, maps, or illustrations) without citation;
- Translating texts or passages from a text without citation.

In such cases, the student's performance cannot be confirmed: The plagiarism will be recorded as "Täuschungsversuch" (literally, "attempt to deceive") in LSF (and, for courses which are not part of a module for a degree program, will be kept on file). A failing grade will be recorded for the course and the student will not receive the corresponding ECTS points. Further consequences and penalties are possible. In suspicious cases the plagiarism software Ouriginal might be used.
